



Figure 2. National Drug-Involved Overdose Deaths*,

HIV/AIDs and OUD- The Vicious Cycle



Harm Reduction

- Definition: person-centered public health approach of reducing harms of a substance to individuals and communities
- Nonjudgmental care
- Collaborates with individuals to promote healthier lives
- Increases engagement and access to resources
- Reduces risk of SUD-related illnesses and overdose



Current State Of OUD/HIV treatment

- Patients with HIV and OUD have suboptimal HIV testing, delayed entry into HIV care and initiation of antiretroviral therapy
- ♦ Barriers to care:
 - Lack of transportation, poverty, homelessness, uninsured
 - Lack of access to life-saving OUD treatment
 - Little to no communication between providers partly due to HIV and OUD care being at different places
 - Stigma



Care Models

- Centralized: Primary care, SUD, psychiatric all in one place
 - Improves access, reduce relapse, improve social stability for patients with co-occuring disorders
 - Studies show that individuals in an HIV clinic receiving on-site buprenorphine treatment have improved addiction treatment outcomes



Care Models Cont.


- Distributive: most providers are not working in centralized treatment settings
 - Has problems with distance between treatment Centers
 - Needs case management to make complex referrals to be effective
- ECHO: Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes
 - Specialists at academic centers provide clinical expertise for specific cases using videoconferencing (helpful for rural areas)

Opioid Agonist Treatment in Pregnancy

- Both methadone and buprenorphine treatment during pregnancy:
 - improve neonatal outcomes by reducing risk of withdrawal
 - increase maternal HIV treatment to reduce the likelihood of transmitting the virus to the fetus
 - link mothers to better prenatal care



Summary

- Patients with HIV/AIDs are more likely to have OUD
- Methadone, Buprenorphine and naltrexone improve outcomes in HIV/AIDS
- Buprenorphine and methadone are safe and effective in pregnancy
- Stigma around OUD in the public and healthcare providers create barriers to life-saving treatment
- Patient-centered approach can reduce stigma and improve outcomes

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Houston EMA Ryan White Part A and MAI Administrative Agency Report

- **FY 2021 HIV Services Contracts:** RWGA is currently conducting its mid-year spending review in preparation of the sweep-up and reallocation process. We anticipate reduction of contracts will be necessary, and that funds will be available for service reallocation. These funds will be reallocated by the Planning Council's Priority and Allocations (P&A) committee on 10/28.
- **FY 2020 Carryover Request:** RWGA is in receipt of it's FY2020 unobligated balance carryover award. Due to COVID pandemic associated waivers, RWGA was able to request greater than 5% of formula funds for \$1,718,511 in Part A funding and \$905,361 in MAI funding. Contract carryover amendments have been submitted by RWGA to County Purchasing for placement on Commissioner's Court agenda for approval.
- HRSA Ryan White Part A Virtual Site Visit Report: RWGA received the final HRSA approval Ryan White Part A Virtual Site Visit Report on October 6th. RWGA and community partners participated in the Virtual Site Visit April 5 9, 2021. Although typically VSV Consultants and HRSA staff have 45 business days from the site visits conclusion to submit final report, there were delays over the summer. As expect, the Houston EMA received 6 finding associated with this the April VSV. RWGA has up to 30 days to respond.
- **RWGA EHE Virtual Site Review:** RWGA completed it's Virtual Ending the HIV Epidemic (EHE) Programmatic Site Review October 5 October 7, 2021. The purpose of the site review was to allow HRSA/HAB the opportunity to: share program expectations and resources for the HRSA HAB EHE Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Award; learn more about the Harris County EHE initiative program, including program operations, community involvement, strengths, barriers and challenges, and conduct discussions about technical assistance (TA) opportunities. Unlike the Part A VSV, there are no finding associated with the EHE. Additionally, feedback from the HRSA lead exit interview was overwhelmingly positive. RWGA expects the associated final HRSA EHE Virtual Site Review within 45 days.

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HCPH is the local public health agency for the Harris County, Texas jurisdiction. It provides a wide variety of public health activities and services aimed at improving the health and well-being of the Harris County community.

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- **Take Charge Texas:** DSHS has notified statewide stakeholders that their new client level database, Take Charge Texas (a.k.a HRAR) will go live December 18, 2021. Testing for CPCDMS imports with the new system is scheduled to begin in November, as CPCDMS will remain the Houston area HIV services client level database for the immediate future.
- **Ryan White Part A Grant Application:** The FY22 FY24 Part A grant application was submitted to HRSA on September 29, 2021 (due date was 10/6/21). This was the first submission of a multi-year competitive application for the Part A program. The recently submitted application will cover a project period of March 1, 2022, through February 28, 2025. Another application submission will not be required until 2024.
- **RWGA EHE Job Posting:** RWGA has reposted it's new EHE position. The Health Equity Specialist posting can be found on the Harris County employment website. The position was revised to encourage interest for those with lived experience in the HIV community.



1. Trauma-Informed Care Initiative

a. TRG continues the COMPASS LEARN Trauma-Informed Learning and Supervisor (TILS) Project. Reachelian Ellison is the lead for this project.

2. create+equity Collaborative

a. TRG's local team continues to meet monthly. The local team as selected the PHQ-9 (for adults) and PQH-A (for adolescents) as its initial mental health screening tool for the c+e project. It will be implemented at three pilot sites in conjunction with a redesigned care pathway and modified Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT). During the pilot project, this screening will be targeted to those PLWH who are not virally suppressed. Once the pilot is concluded, the care pathway and SBIRT will be revised as necessary and implemented for all OAHS and Care Coordination sites.
